A MESSAGE FROM OUR CHAIR

MARK ADLESTONE OBE DL



As we embark on an exciting new era for the Jewish Representative Council, it is important to reflect on the previous twelve months and consider our future plans.

The passing of our bespoke Constitution by a huge margin was a defining moment. This gave us an undeniable mandate to implement the far-reaching reforms required to modernise and reinvigorate the organisation.

This process commenced with an independent Strategic Review. The review recognised the values and history of the organisation. However, it also highlighted that change was essential. It was clear that a Chief Executive was required in order to grasp the community's agenda and drive it forward with key internal and external stakeholders.

I have been so delighted with the progress that has been made since commencing my role in May 2021. Our primary focus has always been looking at engaging with our whole diverse community. Through the Jewish Strategic Group, I had built strong relationships with a number of critically important individuals and organisations. These have been strengthened through regular engagement and visits. I am so grateful to everyone for their time and allowing me to learn about the amazing work that is done on a daily basis.

I speak regularly about living as part of an ecosystem. In order for the community to thrive, we need strong links with those elected to represent us. We have made representations at the very highest levels of local and national government and I have personally seen this during a visit to Downing Street and Westminster. These links have also delivered tangible results not just for the Jewish community across the region we represent but also across the country.

Our communication outside of the community has also been excellent. Marc Levy has appeared on local and national news and our statements have been balanced, carefully thought out and well received. This was emphasised in the first few weeks following my installation as Chair. During the conflict in Israel, we released joint statements with the leadership of Greater Manchester Councils, the Chief Constable of GMP and Metro Mayor, Andy Burnham. The Jewish Representative Council of Greater Manchester (JRC) is now seen as the first point of contact for politicians and the media on issues that affect our community.

Within the JRC, we have created a mechanism to allow the Charedi community to properly engage with the JRC. Our success is being looked at by representative bodies across the world. It is a source of great pride to me personally that I have chaired meetings with representatives from our whole community. Not long ago this would have been considered inconceivable. However, through the dialogue and trust that has developed, we are in a unique position.

Over the next twelve months, the Management Board will commence its work. Each individual will work in conjunction with Marc and have an agenda to progress on behalf of the community. This will create a dynamic organisation designed to be proactive in tackling issues affecting our community. I am so pleased by the number of requests from communal organisations who have approached myself and Marc asking for the JRC to intervene and assist with their work.

I would like to thank the JRC President, Russell Conn and his team of Officers for their work this year. I am truly excited for the next twelve months as we continue to evolve into a modern, effective organisation. We have a number of exciting plans and projects that will be designed to take a strategic view and ensure our community remains strong and dynamic for many years to come.

JEWISH STRATEGIC GROUP AND THE PANDEMIC

The Jewish community across Greater Manchester was hit extremely hard by the Coronavirus pandemic. However, from the difficulties being experienced by communal leaders and their organisations, the Jewish Strategic Group was born and this brought together representatives from organisations across the whole Jewish community alongside members from local and national government.

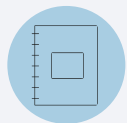
The meetings are co-ordinated by the JRC and Jewish Leadership Council and are chaired by Mark Adlestone OBE DL. They have been addressed by Andy Burnham, the Police and Crime Commissioner, Baroness Beverley Hughes and the Chief Rabbi, amongst others. They allow our communal organisations to engage and explain what is required to look after the vulnerable and needy in our community. This has led to a number of communal visits from MPs and Council Leaders so they are able to better understand the challenges facing our community.

The key communal organisations ensuring the Jewish community were present at each round table. Discussions took place on health and social care, transport, mental health, volunteering and social action.



A directory was designed, created and widely distributed detailing service provision across our Jewish community.



Regular meetings held where concerns on a number of key issues were escalated.



Communication campaign orchestrated alongside the GMCA to inform community members of Covid-19 rules and regulations. Leaflets translated into Hebrew and Yiddish. They were widely distributed amongst our whole community.



Mapping the emergency food provision to take pressure off the food banks.



Arranged for Parliamentary questions to be tabled to ensure kosher food provision in emergency shielding packs.



'Lunch is Not a Luxury' Campaign raised £23,000 in 24 hours to assist children on free school meals. They received their vouchers along with menus detailing healthy meals.

ANTISEMITISM AND ENGAGEMENT WITH THE COMMUNITY SECURITY TRUST (CST) AND GREATER MANCHESTER POLICE

Unfortunately, 2021 saw the Jewish Community across Greater Manchester suffer record levels of hate crime. This was exacerbated by the conflict in the Middle East which accounted for almost half the incidents recorded in the first six months of 2021. In total, the community endured 294 antisemitic incidents representing an 86% increase on 2020.

The JRC immediately called together key internal stakeholders to discuss how to reassure the community. It was decided that a strongly worded statement would be released emphasising how the community must not be targeted due to the situation in the Middle East.

Alongside CST, the JRC were also proactive in engaging with local government and the police. Supportive joint statements were released following meetings with the leadership of Manchester, Salford, Bury, Trafford and Stockport Councils. We also worked with a number of MPs to table written and oral questions asked of the Home Secretary, designed to allow the government to demonstrate their support.

On a national level, the JRC have joined with communal partners from the Jewish Leadership Council, CST and Antisemitism Policy Trust to advocate at the highest levels of government. We have arranged for oral and written questions to be asked of the Home Secretary on the issue of antisemitism. This follows the recent CST report and the terrorist attack targeting a Synagogue in Texas. We also briefed MPs ahead of the recent debates in Westminster dealing with an increase in antisemitic incidents on campuses across the UK, including within Greater Manchester.

Following the recent surge in antisemitic hate crime, we discussed this issue directly with a large number of MPs from across Greater Manchester and beyond. They are now fully briefed on the concerns of our community and the fact that our communal buildings are located behind gates with security guards. This has also enabled us to focus on important legislation designed to combat antisemitism on social media platforms and university campuses. Our discussions have yielded tangible benefits as the legislation is starting to reflect some of our key concerns.

The JRC, JLC and CST also met the newly appointed Chief Constable of Greater Manchester Police (GMP), Stephen Watson and had regular engagement with the Police and Crime Commissioner. At the meetings, it was emphasised how the community was being targeted and why it was essential to counter antisemitism emanating at rallies.

We are also working alongside various levels of GMP to promote engagement and understanding of the Jewish community. GMP has also become an integral member of the Jewish Strategic Group.

PRESS RELEASE

As a local council, it has been profoundly troubling to see the Jewish community targeted on the streets of Bury due to unprovoked reactions from a minority of people to the conflict in the Middle East.

In particular, we were deeply concerned to hear that Community Security Trust have reported exponential increases in antisemitic incidents of death over the previous 14 days. This has understandably sent fear and anxiety throughout our local Jewish community.

Bury Council has not and will not accept any form of hate crime, including either antisemitism or Islamophobia. We are working with the Police to ensure residents this is not tolerated in Bury and that every incident and crime will be followed up and perpetrators brought to justice where possible.

CLIC RICHARD GOLD, CABINET MEMBER FOR COMMUNITIES SAID:
"As a borough, Bury prides itself on being home to people from all different backgrounds – it is what makes Bury the special place it is – one that embraces different cultures, which is why we need to not just hate and act against it wherever we see it."

CLIC EAMONN O'BRIEN, THE LEADER OF BURY COUNCIL SAID:
"Residents are not always going to agree on every issue and that is fine. However, we should be able to disagree in a way that doesn't resort to hatred and victimisation. Neither Hate Crimes nor other types of crimes against residents have any place in Bury."

Their determination to tackle the source of anti-Jewish racism across the Borough is hugely appreciated."

As a direct result of the recent hostilities in the Middle East, the Jewish community across Salford has received an unprecedented rise in antisemitic hate crime. This follows a well-established pattern of Jewish communities being targeted due to a conflict taking place thousands of miles away.

The primary concern of Community Security Trust, Jewish Representative Council of Greater Manchester & Region and Jewish Leadership Council is ensuring that community cohesion remains unshaken. As a result, it is a major concern that the situation in the Middle East has been used as a pretext to single out and target the Jewish community in Salford.

The community in Salford have a long-standing and excellent relationship with the Council. It is therefore unsurprising that during this challenging period, we have been fortunate to rely upon their services and support. Our gratitude to Clr Geoff Hargreaves, Paul Denton, the senior leadership team and Greater Manchester Police for meeting with Amanda Bomstiky and Marc Levy this morning. Their understanding of the ongoing situation and determination to stand against all forms of hate crime is reassuring to Jewish people across the city.

"The Jewish community in Salford is thriving and easily identifiable. As a result, they have recently been subjected to appalling abuse as a direct result of the conflict in the Middle East. While the community being targeted in this manner is appalling, we are fortunate to rely upon the steadfast support of the city mayor, his team and Greater Manchester Police. At the meeting, they reiterated the extensive measures undertaken to ensure that the community remains protected and secure."

SALFORD CITY MAYOR PAUL DENTON SAID:
"It is disappointing to see a crime in the city and it is simply will not be tolerated. Jewish people in this city should be able to live their lives and feel safe – without fear of a verbal or physical attack."

In Salford we stand with the wider UK communities and partners and commit ourselves to do all we can to remove all forms of hate and act where responsible before the courts.

Following the establishment of the GMCA (Greater Manchester Combined Authority) in 2017, the Jewish Representative Council of Greater Manchester, Jewish Leadership Council and Community Security Trust have regularly met with Mayor Andy Burnham and his staff to keeping with its central objective. Jewish Representative Council CEO Clr JLC Regional Manager Marc Levy alongside Clr Huw Morgan Regional Director Amanda Bomstiky met with Mayor Burnham this morning to discuss some recent hate crime targeting Jewish community across Greater Manchester.

It was explained that going to office for two months, antisemitic hate crime directly increased to record levels. During this challenging period, the community were grateful for the workforce and completion support from across the local, regional, and national governments. Mayor Burnham gave strongly reinforced the antisemitism will not be tolerated in any form within Greater Manchester. The feedback, reassurance the community has with GMCA was welcomed and their long-standing relationship in helping the community safe appreciated.

The GMCA are an important member of the Jewish Strategic Group which brings together charities and volunteers with key decision makers. The Mayor has been happy to date with the progress of the body and the community were grateful for personal and assured responses at a recent meeting.

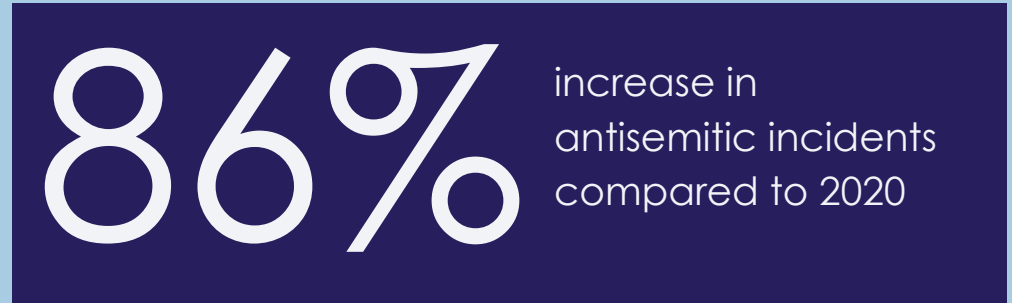
We will continue to build upon the excellent working relationship with the Mayor and the GMCA so that Jewish lives across Greater Manchester are protected and secure.

The Management Board will be responsible for their portfolios ensuring the JRC is at the centre of communal life.



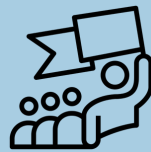

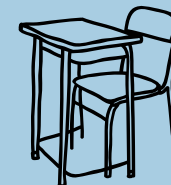
